Not only the talented priests among us, but also those who work in our hospitals in a wide range of

professions. We are truly blessed. It was touching for us all to have a glimpse of the optimism and joy of African worship.

And so, Fr Dominic was duly ordained, vested, anointed and made welcome by all of his brother priests.
