Dear friends

Advent Sunday

Waiting, and waiting, and waiting has been the prevailing mode since we first became acquainted with the Coronavirus pandemic. Waiting for it to spread from China, as it did, to Italy, and from there to Switzerland, and to the United Kingdom. Waiting we were, for its inexorable spread throughout our islands, and then there was Lockdown. From March until July and August we were waiting for some relief, and we enjoyed a respite. Then we were waiting for the Second Wave, and it has duly arrived and now the four nations within the British Isles are in varying degrees of restrictions.

We have been waiting for a vaccine, and then there was one, then two, and three, then more, and now it would seem that widespread vaccination programmes will be introduced globally within the next month or so. We will be waiting for that.

Some folk are waiting for Christmas, not the Sacramental dimension for the most part, but the consumer-fest, the razzamatazz of parties, prezzies, trees and colourful lights.

Some of us will be waiting through the four weeks of the Advent season for a story to unfold. We will be reflecting, deeply aware of our personal responses, to the great story which has undergirded world history. In the Holy Scriptures, there is an unfolding story of waiting: waiting for deliverance from evil, waiting for just rule, waiting for kindness and compassion in the market-place and in the countryside, waiting for freedom from unjust oppressors, waiting for a sign from God, that there may be healing from the wounds that separate us from one another, and from God Himself.

Waiting for this sign from God were prophets, shepherds, kings and wise men. In the unfolding of the Christmas story, the waiting becomes a 'coming', and the story of salvation, of healing is revealed in the Christ Child. 'The Word became flesh and dwells among us full of grace and truth....'

We are still waiting for a wider profound response to the Good News that brings 'Peace to all people of Good-will'. Pray that we do not retard this!

We are waiting for everyone to get the message. For true peace, in the healing of this nation, Europe, the whole Earth, there needs to be shared ideals and practice. Governments may seek to change patterns of behaviour, about social mixing, about plans for travel or isolation, and they are waiting patiently for their persuasive suggestions to be enacted. Herein is a problem as it may become necessary to impose sanctions to ensure compliance, and there is a reluctance to do this.

I would suggest that part of the problem is the cult of the paramountcy of the individual over and against the corporate notion of the Common Good. Catholicism, at its best, has always understood the integrity of the individual in matters of conscience and choice, and has equally emphasised, through Catholic Social Teaching, that our human solidarity imposes obligations on each of us to care for the vulnerable and the weak, and to safeguard the Common Good.

Are Christian better able to respond to the need to comply with Government guidelines and protocols? I hope so, as we should have a clear understanding of the 'bigger story', the narrative of Salvation that runs through human history. So many people, particularly among the young, have no adequate understanding of such a context, no clarity as to why we should behave for wider concerns than simply our own choices and advantages. There has been a huge loss of the Judaean-Christian narrative from the educational process, along with a decline in sympathetic understanding of the spiritual response that engenders worship. Apart from Church schools,

one might suggest that for some time there has been no real proclamation in the educational forum of the Christian narrative that undergirds our civilisation, and the sense of worship.

We are waiting, and waiting and waiting, for a human response that will change the face of the Earth. That is what Advent is about, but it is not about some imaginary world beyond our ken. The human response is yours and mine, now, as by example and encouragement we serve to lead our contemporaries in compliance with health and safety regulations, in humble service to our actual neighbours, in kindly regard for all those who are isolated and distressed.

Advent, the Coming of Christ, this is roll-up-your-sleeves time for Catholics. We are waiting and caring that the tables are being spread for the Eucharistic Banquet. Holy Mass at Christmas is our obligation to ourselves, and the well-spring of our duty to God and all our brothers and sisters.

Emmanuel, God is with us, as He reconciles the world to Himself. It is nothing less than the Coming of the Kingdom of God. For this we are waiting, and acting, doing and praying. God is with us. He will give the increase- a surfeit of Loving-kindness that will renew the face of the Earth. It is a waitinggame, but it is worth waiting for, through Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Easter, Pentecost – when all is renewed by the Creator God, whose spirit brings order from chaos, 'All shall be well, all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well'. [Julian of Norwich]

May the Advent Hope bring you joy and a consecrated resolve to wait in Love for the Happiness of the seasons. Every Blessing, Fr James Lord, Father of our human family, you created all human beings equal in dignity: pour forth into our hearts a fraternal spirit. Move us to create healthier societies and a more dignified world, a world without hunger, poverty, violence and war.

CHRISTMAS ARRANGEMENTS:

Excerpt from a Memo from The Diocese

The First Minister will relax the current Covid restrictions over the festive period.

From 23-27 December inclusive, people are permitted to form a "bubble" of up to three households. It is not possible to 'change the bubble' (i.e., the composition of the individuals, or households) once it has been formed. Travel restrictions will also be relaxed from 23 - 27 December, to allow people to travel between local authority areas, and between the four nations of the UK, in order to join their designated

"bubble". According to the gov.scot website, a "bubble" of people can meet in a private home, in outdoor public places AND in places of worship.

Therefore, people from various parts of the country and beyond will inevitably be travelling to locations within our Diocese, to celebrate Christmas with family members. Some of them will want to join us for the celebration of our Christmas liturgies. We are lucky that the transmission rate in the Diocese of Aberdeen is relatively low: the Highland and Moray deaneries remain in Level 1, with the Shire and Aberdeen City in Level 2. Prudence and common sense dictate that we continue to remain vigilant and to do all that we can to minimise unnecessary transmission risks.

With this in mind, during Christmas week – in other words, from the Christmas Vigil Mass on Thursday 24 December until Sunday 27 December inclusive – every parish and Mass centre in the Diocese offer seat booking for the festive Masses to their own parishioners in the first instance.

In the interests of safety, and of effective infection control management, everyone is welcome to join us 'virtually', via the live-streamed Masses offered by a number of parishes in the diocese.

POLISH-LANGUAGE ADDICTION MEETINGS OFFERED TO CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPEAN PEOPLE LIVING IN HIGHLANDS.

POLISH-language addiction meetings are now being offered to several thousand Central and Eastern European people living in the Highlands.

Pawel Wyderka runs the SMART programme both in person and online on a voluntary basis. Under government guidance, adult addiction meetings can still take place under strict precautions during the Covid restrictions. Having achieved a diploma from the University of Highlands and Islands in Inverness, he is currently working as a counsellor

"SMART Recovery is a mutual support meeting where, through open and confidential discussion, we help each other and ourselves with recovery from any type of addictive behaviour. "If we have chosen to maintain an addictive behaviour, it is possible that we can choose to stop it.

We therefore discourage the use of labels such as alcoholic and addict in our meetings."

Meetings for the Polish-speaking community are held in the Salvation Army Hall at 20 Tomnahurich Street every Saturday at 4pm. Mr Wyderka also holds online SMART meetings for the Polish-language group every Thursday at 8pm.
