The Holyday Obligation remains suspended, but for those who are able to attend this would be a devout act of Catholic communion with our brothers and sisters throughout the world, particularly as we continue to pray for an end to the Pandemic.

FIRST HOLY COMMUNIONS : Sat 15 May : 1000 hrs and 1200 hrs.

The Primary 5 First Holy Communion from St Joseph's Primary School were postponed last year due to the Coronavirus restrictions. Each child will have about five or six guests. There are about eight/nine children at each Mass. It is clear that with the restricted numbers we will not be able to have [m]any spare seats.

Stewart MacLennan [R.I.P.] Stewart a regular Mass-goer, a devout life-long Catholic and the widower of the late Margaret MacLennan, died on Thursday evening with his sons beside him.

Details of the funeral arrangements will be posted when known.

The Ignatian Year : Thu 20 May 21 until 31 July 22

Many who admire the life of St Ignatius Loyola, inspired by his example and assisted in their devotion by his contribution to the Spiritual life, will be following the Ignatian Year.

Thu 20 May 1521 is the date of the Siege/Battle of Pamplona in which Inigo Loyola was wounded- his leg was shattered by a cannon ball. After battle-field surgery, and subsequent surgery to realign his leg, the recovering soldier during his recovery began to read spiritual books a Life of Christ and saintly biographies. Leaving his home he made a pilgrimage to the Monastery at Montserrat [Shrine of the Black Madonna, where he handed over his sword and divested himself of his military accoutrements]. On 25 March 25 1522, he descended from Montserrat to Manresa. He settled and lived there for eleven months, much longer than he had anticipated. Ignatius always considered his stay in Manresa as very important. His life in the city had been for him a kind of novitiate in the things of the spirit. It was there while sitting by the River Cardoner that he had what he referred to as “illuminations”.

Saint Ignatius describes it in his autobiography: "And while sitting there, the eyes of understanding began to open for him. It was not that he saw a vision, but that he understood and knew many things with such great enlightenment that all things seemed new to him “.

Seeing things afresh, with an Ignatian perspective is the opportunity the Ignatian Year gives all who take part. Every week there will be a short Ignatian reflection in the Bulletin.

From Wed 12 May there will be a Novena of St Ignatius, ending on Thu 20 May.

Dear Friends

7 May 21

Slowly, ever so slowly we are opening -out into a new future. Life will not be the same again, as Covid 19 has been a 'game-changer' in which we have had to learn new skills, adapt and cope with the perplexing and sometimes harrowing circumstances. For most of us we have escaped disease, death and family disaster, yet we know that for some families these have been the sad realities. Yet, we have witnessed heroic and sacrificial work by all at the front-line of care, perseverance in scientific enquiry, helpful co-operation in public health and many others in a wide range of occupations working selflessly for the Common Good. Perhaps we have all learned a little more about the interdependence of all human life.

Now, emerging from the overshadowing gloom we are at least in these Islands aware of the recovery of auld acquaintances we have ne'er forgotten, delighting again in sharing the joys of eating with friends, even perhaps going to a restaurant. Some are even planning holidays- recalling some words of mine of earlier this year my own holidays will be within these British Isles, and that is despite getting a new passport (UK Blue, and for ten years, ever the optimist).

If there is anything to remember this week it is surely how resilient people have been, how innovative and how supportive of others. There are qualities that emerge in adversity, and it is good to consider them and to cherish the sheer goodness that lies within most people.

If we have opportunities to do a little more 'encouraging one another day by day' then learned lessons will be exemplary for others and good in themselves, for all of us.

In our Sunday Gospel reading from St John we find Jesus reminding his disciples that their knowledge of him is to be expressed in love.

Those who know Jesus well are taught by Jesus that Love is the sign of a true disciple. Even more, a true disciple shows a particular kind of Love, sacrificial Love.

In the Greek, there are two words for Love that are used in this passage. The first is agape. The second is philia. The first word is most often used to describe Love for other persons and for God. It is understood as the highest and most perfect kind of Love a Love that is about caring for the ultimate good of another, . It can be sacrificial. The second word is used to describe the affection of friendship. The root of the Greek word for friend comes from this second term for Love, philia. By using this word, Jesus transforms the terms of his relationship with his disciples and re-defines for them their relationship with God. In the Hebrew Scriptures, faith in God made one a servant of God. Here Jesus teaches that his relationship to his disciples is based on friendship, not servitude. These are interesting things to tease out in our minds and our prayerful living. We are called to unconditional caring Love, the sacrifice in which we share with Jesus our offering to God the Father- at Mass we live this out liturgically, and from Mass we live it out in loving-kindness. Yet there remains Friendship, this closely affectionate attraction which we share with others. Those who are close to Jesus feel this attraction, this persuasive goodness that urges us on: The Love of Christ urges us on.

Friendship is our gift to the world- we learn it from Jesus and each other and in 'being friends' we are poised to express the Love of God, the ultimate concern for each other's good, his or her dignity and welfare.

On the Passion and Resurrection of Jesus Christ as Revelation of the Trinity**

**The 2021 Pluscarden Pentecost Lectures
to be given by Fr Thomas Joseph White OP
Director of the Thomistic Institute and Professor of Systematic Theology
Pontifical University of St Thomas (Angelicum), Rome**

Each year the Abbot and Community of Pluscarden Abbey sponsor a series of four lectures by an invited Theologian on an aspect of Catholic Theology. Previous Lecturers have included Fr Aidan Nichols OP, Fr Thomas Weinandy OFM Cap, Fr Anthony Meredith SJ, Fr Paul McPartlan, Prof. Carol Zaleski, and Dom Erik Varden. The Lectures are held on the Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday after Pentecost in St Scholastica’s Retreat House at the Abbey. They are open to all.

The Lecturer



Fr Thomas Joseph White is a Dominican priest, who lives and teaches at the Pontifical University of St Thomas (Angelicum) in Rome, where he is the Director of the Thomistic Institute. Originally a native of south-eastern Georgia (USA), Fr White studied at Brown University. He converted to Catholicism in his senior year, influenced by reading Flannery O’Connor, Aristotle, Newman, von Balthasar and John Paul II. He did his doctoral studies at Oxford University where his research focused on Aquinas’ metaphysics and arguments for the existence of God.

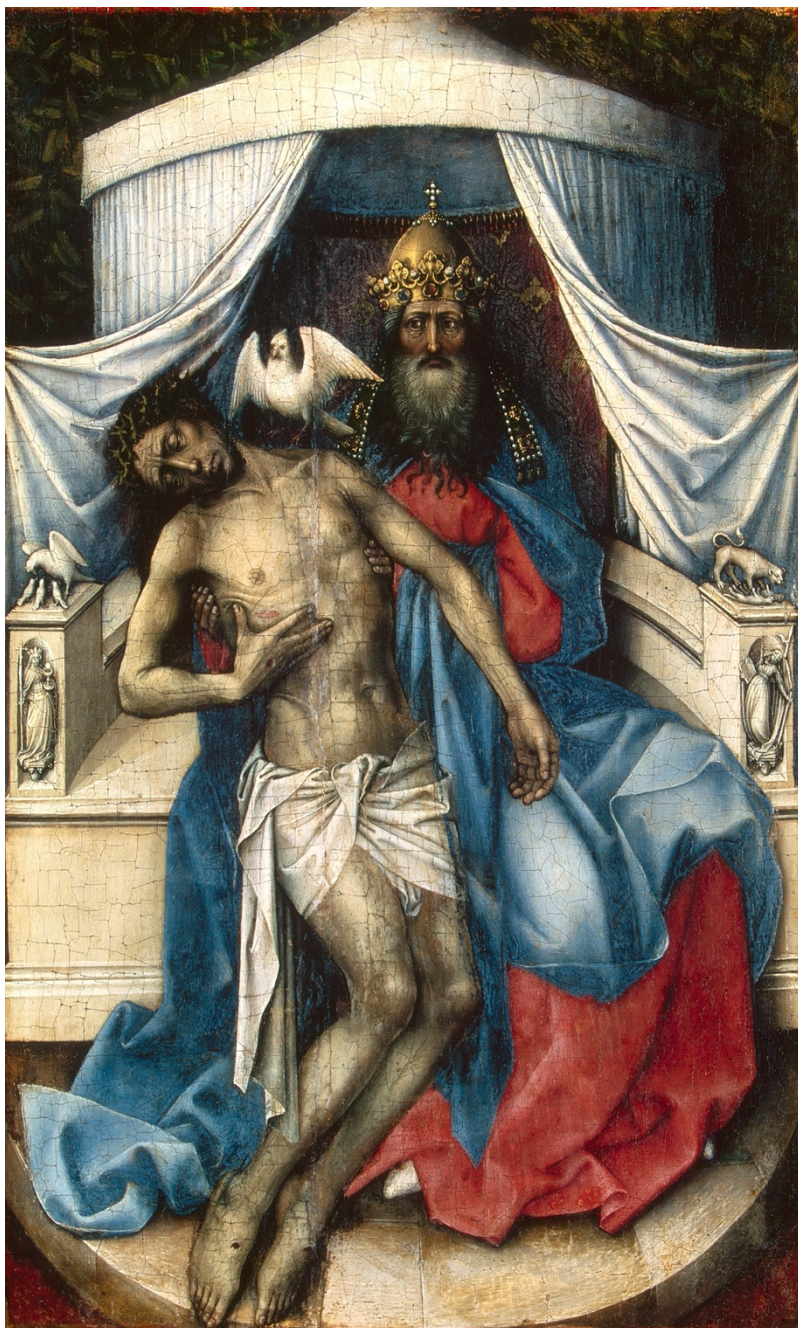
Fr White is the author of various books and articles including *Wisdom in the Face of Modernity, A Thomistic Study in Natural Theology* (Sapientia Press, 2009, second

edition 2016), *The Incarnate Lord, A Thomistic Study in Christology* (The Catholic University of America Press, 2015), *Exodus* (Brazos Press, 2016), *The Light of Christ: An Introduction to Catholicism* (The Catholic University of America Press, 2017), and *The Trinity: On the Nature and Mystery of the One God* (forthcoming from The Catholic University of America Press).

With Matthew Levering he is the co-editor of the academic journal *Nova et Vetera*. In 2011 he was appointed an ordinary member of the Pontifical Academy of St. Thomas Aquinas and in 2019 was named a Distinguished Scholar of the McDonald Agape Foundation. He held the 2018-2019 McInnes Chair for theological inquiry at the Angelicum.

The Lectures

“One of the Trinity was Crucified”: On the Passion and Resurrection of Jesus Christ as Revelation of the Trinity



Modern Trinitarian theologians have commonly focused on a key question of the Christian faith. How do the passion and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth reveal to us the mystery of God as Trinity?

In these lectures we will explore various ways of answering this question by considering facets of the Paschal Mystery. How do Christ's diverse actions and sufferings as man reveal to us the mystery of the Father, his own Lordship as Son, and the Gift of the Holy Spirit?

Taking inspiration from St Thomas Aquinas, we will treat the crucifixion, death and resurrection of Jesus as a privileged locus of disclosure of the very mystery of God in himself.

Lecture 1: The Agony of Gethsemane and the Obedience of the Son

In the Garden of Gethsemane Jesus experiences intensive human agony in the face of his impending torture, crucifixion and death. He also freely embraces the mystery of the Cross in humble obedience to his Father's will. What is the Trinitarian dynamic disclosed in this event and how can it serve as a prelude to our understanding of the Passion in general?

Lecture 2: Suffering and Crucifixion: Atonement as Trinitarian Revelation

The voluntary suffering of Christ in his Passion is traditionally understood to stem from divine love. How is the love of the Trinity manifest in the voluntary abasement and death of Christ? What is the mechanism of the atonement, by which God reconciles us with himself in Christ, and how is it revelatory of the persons of the Trinity?

Lecture 3: Jesus' Descent into Hell and the Mystery of Trinitarian Love

Jesus' acceptance in his person of the consequences of death demonstrates his solidarity with the human race. It also manifests his Lordship, and his capacity to address even on Holy Saturday the universal effects of human death.

Lecture 4: Bodily Resurrection and Exaltation: Cumulative Revelation of Jesus as Son and Lord

The resurrection entails the glorification of the body and soul of Christ. It also manifests the Son as the only-begotten of the Father, who pours out his Holy Spirit upon the apostles and the Church. Just as the Father is the Father of the creation and the re-creation through his Son and Word, so the Son is the only-begotten through whom God has made all things and is the final principle in whom the re-creation of all things is inaugurated.

If, as seems likely, it is not possible to host this year's Lectures at the Abbey, they will be live streamed, probably direct from Rome. Please check the website regularly for any updates. It is planned to have recordings available via the website for those who cannot tune in at the appropriate times.
