Dear Friends,

Week-in, week-out, it's a relentless grind just managing the routine these days. So much to do, so little time to get it done, or is this simply the exasperations of a not so young man who imagines that he can keep up a schedule of an even younger man. Everything seems to take so much longer, when we are managing the Covid restrictions. I had to take some time out, and isolate for two days when I was contacted as I had been sitting close to two people who had developed Covid. Thankfully they seem to be coping with its miseries, and I found the testing regime at the Eden Court Car Park very straightforward. A day later I had a Negative result, so all was well. But, it makes one think!

There is so much of the Covid virus about, so we must still continue the Health and Safety protocols in our Church – and, one hopes, elsewhere. In a sense we have a moral responsibility to care for others in an exemplary way. That is why the Holy Father has urged all Catholics to be vaccinated, and why we are being given every opportunity by the NHS to have this done.

It is good to see Catholic life and worship returning, not quite to 'normal', but to refreshing expressions which take into account our new circumstances. Yes, we are able to accommodate a few more at Masses, while retaining our safety distances; yes, we are able to have a restrained use of incense to accompany our prayers and our yearnings for holiness; yes, we are able to sing again, albeit with masks and from hymn sheets; yes, we can enjoy the organ accompaniment again now that Peter Hodgkinson is safely at the console; yes, our choir is picking up again, and Eddie is ready to welcome new singers; yes, we are resuming some home visits, and visits to Nursing Homes is easier than it was.

So many 'yesses' are surely grounds for optimism, and perhaps, even the glimmer of a hope that the routine will be less hectic, and that the usually comfortable month of August will give each of us an opportunity for some ease and reflection.

This first week starts off well with two marvellous celebrations. On Wed 4 August we celebrate the memorial of St John Mary Vianney, [the Cure d'Ars], born in 1786 and who died in 1859, a priest of simple life, and great practical wisdom and insight. It is said that so many people came to him for confession and spiritual advice that he spent upon to eighteen hours a day at this pastorate. Now, that is in a sense relentless, and he remains the hard-working exemplar of parish priests.

There is a stained glass window at St Mary's, which remembers all our previous parish priests – perhaps especially those of recent memory: Michael Savage, Robert McDonald, Duncan Stone, Alexander Sullivan, Valentine MacKenzie and George Shaw. That goes back some time, perhaps some of you will remember or have heard of others.

It is good to recall the service of the pastors who have served at St Mary's. Provision has been made, partly by a bequest of ± 100 , and from general funds to provide a Board listing all the parish priests from Terence McGuire in 1827. This will be made by PJ using special ply-board, a laser torch and varnishes. We are projecting costs at about ± 600 . Donations toward that will be welcome.



Later in the week, on Fri 6 Aug, we have the Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord Jesus Christ. This festival was celebrated in Jerusalem as early as the 7th century, and by the 9th century widely observed in the Eastern Church. It was gradually introduced into the Western Church, and the date of the observance was fixed as 6 August by Pope Callixtus III in 1457 as a thank-offering for the victory over the Turks at Belgrade on that day in 1456. In 2002 Pope John Paul II updated the meditations of the Rosary with five "Luminous Mysteries," of which the Transfiguration is one. When we recall the Transfiguration we are aware that we are sharing the insights of the Apostles, Peter, James and John, and also the Gospel writers, Mark, Matthew and Luke, into the Mystery of Jesus. The narratives tell us that the Son of God is radiant in the humanity of Jesus, and he is seen as the fullest expression of the Law and Prophets, represented in the narrative by Moses and Elijah. It is a prelude to the death of Jesus and the Easter victory in which we now live. Keeping the Feast of the Transfiguration enables us, in prayerful reflective study, to delve into the Mystery of the Cross and the Resurrection. It is a beautiful feast and one in which each of us can begin to see Jesus in a new light- let us keep the feast : Mass on Friday at 1230.



One of the recently ordained priests, Fr Malachy Eze, is visiting the Parish for a few days, with his mother Madame Eze. It may be that they will be able to attend some of our Masses. I know that they will be made welcome.



Fr Christopher is now away with Fr Andrew Niski and the ladies of the Community of St Andrew on a Pilgrimage to Ireland with about forty young people, some from the Highlands. We will keep them in our prayers. **The Hospital Chaplaincies** :

Aidan is from Elgin and has a keen interest in Liturgical music.

The Ignatian Year : Reflections

We are following Ignatius, the Pilgrim for Jesus Christ, as he makes his way on the journey of faith. Week by week, using his Autobiography as a basis we reflect on the different stages of his journey and the people he meets. The experiences following the crippling injuries sustained at the Siege of Pamplona in 1621, and his insights at Manresa, enable us to walk with him, entering into his own engagement with the Lord. If you are already doing this please let me know how it is going for you. We are on the Eleventh Reflection, and with one a week planned until 31 July 2022 it is a challenging opportunity. I am enjoying the research and the thought that it engenders, and I have found that it can give a useful background shape to reflective prayer for the week.

If there were to be enough interest we could devote a Gabriel Society Meeting to an "Ignatian Journey Study" in the newly furbished Marian Room. We might even be able to persuade a wellknown confectioner of this Parish to bake a Ginger Cake, very special indeed.

Blairs Museum launches new interactive virtual museum

Start from Tuesday 27 July 2021

Blairs Museum, Scotland's National Catholic Museum has launched a brand-new website featuring an interactive virtual museum and shop, thanks to funding from the Scottish Government's "Museum Recovery and Resilience Fund" established to protect Scotland's culture and heritage sectors from the impacts of Covid-19.

The new website unites all the collections of the Scottish Catholic Heritage Collections Trust Museum, and the historic Library and Archive (both of which are on loan to the University of Aberdeen). The website also provides a link to the Scottish Catholic Archives at Columba House in Edinburgh.

This project was funded through a significant Recovery and Resilience Grant from Museums Galleries Scotland. In July 2020, the Scottish Government allocated £4 million to the Museum Recovery and Resilience Fund from the £97 million package of funding to protect Scotland's culture and heritage sectors from the impacts of Covid-19.

The Museum Recovery and Resilience Fund aims to secure the future of Scottish independent museums put at risk by the pandemic and to protect the vital role that they play in their communities.

Museum curator and project lead Amy Miller said:

"The Covid-19 pandemic has prevented many visitors from coming in person to view our collections at Blairs. This new website and suite of online resources allows anyone with an internet connection to see our museum and treasures safely. We have 3D scanned a selection of our artefacts and users can interact with the object by zooming and rotating it to see all the details."

She added: "We have also created a YouTube Channel to host our new series of web videos about our collections and the amazing stories they tell. We are still adding new videos so it is well worth checking the channel regularly."

The new website also features learning resources for school pupils to use in conjunction with the virtual museum so learning can take place with or without a physical visit. Schools will also have the option to "Contact a Curator", where museums staff can lead learning sessions through videoconferencing software.

Lucy Casot, CEO of Museums Galleries Scotland said:

"We are pleased to support Blairs Museum through the Recovery and Resilience Fund. The museum has faced loss of income and a multitude of challenges caused by the pandemic. They have responded to these difficulties with forward thinking plans to expand their online activities and support visitors and school children to explore this important cultural collection from afar."

Votive Candles


We have kept the Novena – but if you have missed it, or part of it you can catch-up at any time. There are printed copies available from the Parish Office.
