# "Loss and Damage: A Call to Action"

At COP26 in Glasgow, one of the biggest disappointments was the failure to agree a fund for Loss and Damages. Countries which are most vulnerable to climate change and yet the least responsible, need financial support from industrialised countries who were, and continue to be, responsible for gas emissions. A Dialogue was set-up to continue the conversation. At COP27 in Egypt no conclusion was brought to this dialogue. Now is the moment for world leaders to take responsibility for the damage caused by climate change especially affecting the smallest and most vulnerable countries. COP28 in the United Arab Emirates should not be mere talk but take decisive action to create a robust fund to aid those struggling with climate change that threatens their very existence. May those taking part in the Conference be strategists capable of considering the common good and the future of their children, more than the short-term interests of certain countries or businesses. In this way, may they demonstrate the nobility of politics and not its shame. (Laudate Deum 60) I pray that the hearts and consciences of all participants will be sensitive and open to the cries of the poor and weak and I entrust them to the intercession of St Andrew, our patron saint, on whose feast day COP28 will begin in Dubai.

Ave Christus Rex Universorum! This weekend we celebrate the triumph of Christ as Lord of all creation. Surprisingly, this is a relatively new feast in the Church, having only been inaugurated by Pope Pius XI in 1925. Its position as the final Sunday in the liturgical calendar is even more recent, within the living memory of many parishioners, having been moved from the last Sunday in October to the last in November only in 1970. Interestingly,  $25^{th}$  October 1970, the last Sunday of October that year, was also the day that the forty martyrs of England and Wales were canonised and until relatively recently (still in Wales) this remained their feast day. How ironic and fitting, perhaps even intentional, that these saints, who lost their lives for supposed disloyalty to an earthly monarch, should have their reward confirmed on a day until then associated with Christ's Heavenly rule, members of His Kingdom that we know is not of this world.

Like most feasts, the celebration of Christ the King did not arise in a vacuum. The end of October was associated with the Reformation and so part of the motivation was to serve as a reminder of the temporal authority of His Body, the Church, channelled through Tradition, the hierarchy and the Magisterium. The focus was on Christ's rights over us in the here and now and our corresponding responsibilities to Him as subjects. In the Encyclical that precipitated the feast, Pius XI himself stated that "All men, whether collectively or individually, are under the dominion of Christ. In Him is the salvation of the individual, in Him is the salvation of society" (Quas Primas 18). Celebrating this feast at the end of October was also intended to be close to All Saints' Day, to emphasise how a Heavenly reward was available and accessible for those who continue Christ's mission, while on earth, of creating His Kingdom. The change to the end of November shifts the emphasis from the temporal to the cosmic and eschatological. This is thematically linked to the idea of the Second Coming which dominates at the beginning of Advent and so highlights the unbroken continuity of the liturgical cycle, a mission - "ite, Missa est" - which has as its purpose the triumph of Christ in all hearts. This reality is only present at the moment "in mystery", as Lumen Gentium (#3) reminds us, and will only be perfected at the end of time.

We are reminded of this well-founded expectation at every Mass. We affirm in the Creed that "He will come again in glory to judge the living in the dead" and in the prayers after the Our Father, the priest says "... As we wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ" and the people respond "... For the Kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and forever". Perhaps today, as we say these words, we may reflect on the glory that is only Christ's, that is only won by His victory on the Cross, that has begun already and will endure for all eternity, that we belong to through our baptism, when we became members of His royal family. So, we hail our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, the Divine Redeemer, and we crown with many crowns the Lamb upon His throne today and for all eternity.
